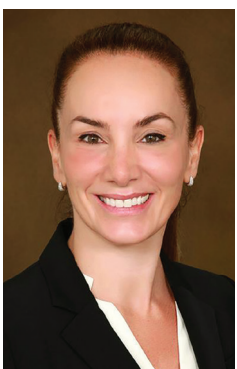


Sabrina Newman, MD

The Truths about Your Skin and How to Care for It

Good skin care can often be confusing. Dr. Newman will debunk skin care myths and share skin care tips. She will also discuss the effects of medications and maturity on your skin.

Dr. Sabrina Newman is Assistant Professor of Dermatology at CU School of Medicine, Director of Inpatient Dermatology Consult Service, and co-Director of the multidisciplinary rheumatology-dermatology clinic. She obtained her medical degree from Georgetown University School of Medicine and is a member of the Alpha Omega Alpha Medical Honor Society. Dr. Newman completed a combined Dermatology-Internal Medicine residency at Georgetown University and is board-certified in dermatology and internal medicine. She leads the telemedicine initiative for the Department of Dermatology, and through her volunteer work, is committed to improving timely access to dermatologic care. She is dedicated to a clinical practice in complex medical dermatology with a focus on cutaneous drug eruptions and inpatient consultative dermatology.

Liver, Gall Bladder, and Pancreas: More than Just Accessories

The liver, gall bladder, and pancreas play an important role beyond digestion yet they are often regarded simply as accessories to digestion. Dr. Gleisner will discuss the critical function of these organs as well as common diseases that affect them.

Dr. Ana Gleisner is an Assistant Professor of Surgery. She obtained her medical degree from Universidade Federal de Rio Grande do Sol and completed her residency at the Saint Louis University School of Medicine followed by a fellowship in complex surgical oncology the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center. Additionally, she holds a doctorate degree in medical sciences. In 2015, she joined the Department of Surgery, Division of Surgical Oncology at the University of Colorado School of Medicine. Her specialty areas include biliary, gastrointestinal, and liver surgery.



Evalina Burger, MD

Back Pain and Birthdays: A Smorgasbord of Pathologies

How do you know if back pain is short term, age-related, or something else? What are red flags in back pain? Dr. Burger will share her expertise on back issues and explain new technologies and advances in back surgery.

After obtaining her medical degree with honors in South Africa, Dr. Evalina Burger became a captain in the South African Defense Force Medical Corp where she treated injuries of war and mine explosions. Following residency, she dedicated her career to spine surgery and received national acclaim as the first female surgeon to be named a prestigious ABC fellow. She was recruited to Louisiana State University in 2001, and in 2006, she joined the University of Colorado Department of Orthopedics where she founded the Adult Spine Unit. She has won numerous awards for her research and has received international recognition for her work on thermoplastic behavior of metal rods and on the advantages of disk replacement. After serving in various leadership positions in the department, she became the first recipient of the Robert d'Ambrosia Endowed Chair in Orthopedics.
